Our "Musical Discoveries" programme is customisable and suitable for students (MEP, tertiary level, etc.), fellow academics, music educators, music lovers, and anyone who wishes to deepen their knowledge of music and exchange ideas within a friendly and facilitated setting.

We focus on aural perception and analytical skills, so that participants have a basic grasp of different epochs, stylistic idioms, and genres. Going beyond the historical categories of the Middle Ages, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, 20th and 21st centuries, we explore different facets of music: its cultural phenomenon, manifestations, stories, scandals, and connections to other aspects of society. We explore the genealogy and origin of genres, and pose questions as to why certain styles and forms of entertainment have prevailed while others have died out.

We hope to get participants to reflect on why and how they play music, why and how they listen, and to think about the diverse ways in which music can profoundly impact and transform our lives.
